*The US government's Department of Justice, Homeland Security, and FBI are launching a series of programs that threaten to vilify the normal adolescent thoughts and words of Muslim youth. The programs, patterned after the "Prevent" program in the UK, have been challenged by a long list of civil rights advocates, including the ACLU and NYU Law School's Brennan Center. Ignoring the concerns of providers, the government quietly continues its launch of the programs, with funding. Refusing to participate is an ethical mandate for psychologists.

* Bruce Montgomery is professor at the University of Colorado and founding director of the former UCB Human Rights Initiative. He has served as an analyst of classified documents for the U.S. government and has been an invited consultant for the Institute for Defense Analysis in creating the Conflict Records Research Center (CRRC), a digital resource center that makes digital copies of captured al-Qaeda, Taliban and Saddam Hussein-era records available for scholarly study. He is the author of three books: Richard B. Cheney and the Rise of the Imperial Vice Presidency (2009), The bush-Cheney Administration's Assault on Open Government (2008), and Subverting Open Government: White House Materials and Executive Branch Politics (2006). Articles by Montgomery have appeared in leading academic journals, including the International Journal of Cultural Property, Political Science Quarterly, Presidential Studies Quarterly, Peace Studies, The American Archivist, Archivaria, and the Washington Post.
